# **WELCOME**

#### **BARRY ROSE OBE**

Barry Rose (b. 1934) was appointed the first Organist and Master of the Choristers of the new Guildford Cathedral in 1960, a post he held until 1974. He set about creating a musical foundation with daily sung services starting the day after the Consecration. Over the first year or so there was the inevitable hesitant start by the boys, but they were encouraged and supported by a most expert and musical group of Lay Clerks, many of whom were accomplished soloists in their own right. The Guildford choir soon established itself at the forefront of choral music of the time, a position that it has retained ever since. We welcome Barry back this evening to conduct Evensong with our girl and boy choristers, in celebration of his 90th birthday later this month.

# THE MUSIC

# INTROIT A Grateful Heart Mary Plumstead (1905-1980).

Words of George Herbert (1593-1633), set to music for the 1974 wedding of Brian and Angela Rayner Cook, Brian was one of Barry's very first choirboys at St. Anne's Church, Chingford Hatch (London) in the mid 1950's, and went on to Bristol University to study conducting. Switching to singing, he became a post-graduate student at the Royal College of Music, where he was taught by Redvers Llewellyn. At the height of his career as an internationally known baritone soloist, Brian and Barry met up again in the late 1970s, and it was Brian who persuaded Barry to introduce A Grateful Heart as an anthem at a boys' only Monday Evensong in St. Paul's Cathedral, where it was later recorded by Paul Phoenix.

# **OPENING VERSICLES AND RESPONSES** John Abdenour (b. 1962)

John and Barry first met in 1980 when John, at 17 years old, was interim organist of Detroit Cathedral, USA. Since then, they have remained in contact, mainly through the SING PRAISES Choir Festivals, which John started with Vince Edwards (see below) in 1996. These *Preces*, part of a complete set of *Responses* with organ accompaniment, were custom-written for the festival when it was just upper voices, with a cantor's part for one of the participating choristers.

#### **HYMN** Christ is made the sure foundation

With music adapted from the closing chorus of Henry Purcell's anthem *O God, Thou art my God*, the text is the second half of J. M. Neale's translation of *Urbs beata Jerusalem*, and was sung here on the 17 May 1961, at the Consecration of the Cathedral. Twenty years later, it was also the first hymn at the Royal Wedding in St. Paul's Cathedral (29 July 1981), at which Barry directed the choir, and as a Wedding present to Charles, then Prince of Wales, he wrote a new descant to the last verse, now to be sung here this evening.

# **PSALM 150** Barry Rose (b.1934)

The SING PRAISES choir Festival mentioned above, still continues under Barry's leadership – in February of this year, he was in Grace Church, Providence, Rhode Island, to direct this year's festival, one of several venues where it has taken place since 1996. In 2002, the festival was held at St. Bartholomew's Church, Park Avenue, New York, where Vince Edwards was then in charge of the boy and girl choristers. Rather than have the psalm sung to Anglican chant on this occasion, Vince asked Barry to write a new and rhythmic setting of the familiar text of Psalm 150, for divisi upper voices and organ.

# **THE MAGNIFICAT** Mark Blatchly (b. 1960)

A chorister here at Guildford from 1968 to 1973, Mark went on to Charterhouse, and from there, at the age of just 17, he came to St. Paul's Cathedral for a year to work with Barry – before going up to Oxford, as organ scholar at Christ Church. During his time at St. Paul's, he covered the organist's sabbatical, playing for the majority of the daily Services, as well as making his first commercial recording. As a leaving-present to the choir and Barry, he wrote this imaginative treble-voice setting of the *Magnificat* (with its accompanying *Nunc Dimittis*) and it was first sung in an Evensong in the Cathedral in March 1979.

# **NUNC DIMITTIS** Geoffrey Burgon (1941-2010)

Educated in Guildford, at Pewley School (later George Abbot school), Geoffrey was a first-study trumpeter at the Guildhall School of Music, switching to composition and studying with Peter Wishart. In 1979 the BBC commissioned Geoffrey to compose the incidental music for a dramatization of John le Carré's newly published novel *Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy.* It was Geoffrey's idea to have a setting of the *Nunc Dimittis* (with solo trumpet part) as the closing credits rolled, and he gave the manuscript copy to Barry - then at St. Paul's Cathedral – to see if he could provide a treble soloist to sing it. That soloist was Paul Phoenix, and with Barry playing the organ part, they recorded it for the programme. Since then, it has been sung around the world, and must surely be the best-known setting of these words.

# THE LESSER LITANY, LORD'S PRAYER AND PRECES

Malcolm Archer (b. 1952)

Prolific composer and fellow Cathedral-organist, Malcolm and Barry first met in Bristol in 1983, when Malcolm was appointed as organist at the Cathedral, and where he wrote this unaccompanied 3-part setting of the *Responses* for his choristers. They renewed contact when Barry and Buffie moved to Somerset in 1997. By then Malcolm was organist at nearby Wells Cathedral, where Barry became not just the producer of many of their CD recordings, but also a deputy bass in the Cathedral choir! Their long-standing friendship still continues, and last October, they were both here at the Cathedral, when Barry was recording some of Malcolm's organ works.

# THE 3rd SET of SACRED SONGS Alan Ridout (1934-1996)

Another 1934 musician, Alan had already composed two sets of Sacred Songs for the choristers of Canterbury Cathedral when, in 1969, Barry approached him to see if he'd write a similar set for the Guildford choristers. Alan said yes, and the manuscript copies arrived in time for the first performance in the Cathedral on Whit Sunday of that year. It was a happy coincidence that Alan and Barry were later to be re-united, as musical colleagues at The King's School, Canterbury, with Alan writing several works for the school choir, and also a Spirit of '34' organ piece, dedicated to Barry.

# HYMN Immortal, invisible, God only wise

Walter Chalmers Smith's 19th century text still finds a place in many Services, and at St. Paul's Cathedral it was included in HM The Queen's Silver Jubilee (1977), and HM Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother's 80th Birthday Service (1980). It was for the latter occasion that (now Bishop) Richard Fenwick, then at St. Pauls, and later Precentor here at Guildford, added an extra verse to the text, and Barry wrote the descant to be sung this evening, and now included in several hymnals.

# GOD BE WITH YOU TILL WE MEET AGAIN Barry Rose (b. 1934)

Every year, since 2002, Barry has visited Grace Church, New York, where he works with the boy and girl choristers, and every year the juniors and novices (probationers) give an annual concert, which he directs. He has written a number of pieces specially for them, always bearing in mind the musical and vocal standards they can then achieve. The text comes from the USA, and is by Jeremiah Eames Rankin (1828-1904), dating from 1903, just before his death, and may have been his way of saying 'goodbye'. Dedicated to Patrick Allen and the Grace Church choristers, this setting is scored for three-part choir, organ, and flute (the Associate Organist at Grace Church in 2002 was also a flautist). Today the flute part is played by Oscar, a former Guildford Head Chorister and current changed voice singer.

# **INTRADA** Grayston Ives (b. 1948)

Grayston (Bill) Ives was a tenor lay clerk here from 1971 to 1975, later joining the King's Singers, with whom he sang for seven years. Bill had studied composition with Richard Rodney Bennett, and during his time at Guildford he wrote four contrasting pieces for the choir – including the popular *Listen*, sweet Dove, and the more challenging Let all the world in every corner sing. In 1977, Barry approached Bill, to see if he could compose a piece for Barry to play for the Royal Procession at the opening of The Queen's Silver Jubilee Service in St. Paul's Cathedral. Now a completed recital piece (the version to be played today), it originally ended in another key, to lead into the Ralph Vaughan Williams' arrangement of *All people that on earth do dwell*.


