THE ORDINATION OF PRIESTS

From its earliest days, the Church has set individuals apart for particular ministries. Through prayer and the laying-on of hands by the bishop and presbyters, the Church authorizes and equips new presbyters (priests) to celebrate the sacraments and to act as servants and shepherds to the people of God. Because we recognize that human strength is insufficient the ordination is preceded by prayer that the Holy Spirit will fill the candidates with grace and power to fulfil the ministry to which God has called each one of them.

We offer a warm welcome to all who are taking part in this service, especially to the families and friends of the ordinands.

Please take time before the service to pray for the ordinands and their families, and for the parishes in which they will serve.



THE BISHOPS

The Bishop of Dorking, the Right Reverend Paul Davies, presides and ordains priests at this service and the Bishop of Guildford, the Right Reverend Andrew Watson, assists him.

LITURGICAL DEACON

The liturgical deacon for today's service is the Reverend Canon Cathy Blair, Associate Minister St. Mary's, Walton-on-Thames and Initial Ministerial Training 2 Officer.

MUSIC

Guildford Cathedral Choir is directed by Katherine Dienes-Williams, Organist and Master of the Choristers. The organ will be played by Asher Oliver, Sub Organist, except for the voluntary at the end of the service, which is played by Katherine Dienes-Williams.

The Stag Hill Ensemble will also play during the service.

The setting of the Eucharist is the 'Missa Simplex' by Katherine Dienes-Williams (b. 1970).

PRACTICAL NOTES

ORDER OF SERVICE

People attending this year's ordination services have been encouraged to access it on their phone or tablet. (There is a QR code at the stewards' desk should you wish to access it.) The order of service contains all you need to follow and participate in the service, including the texts of prayers, readings and hymns. If you do not have access to an electronic copy, please ask the stewards for a paper order of service.

THE ADMINISTRATION OF COMMUNION

Christians of all traditions who have been admitted to Holy Communion in their own churches are welcome to receive Communion at this service (and indeed at all Cathedral services).

Please follow the direction of the stewards to receive Holy Communion. Both the consecrated bread and wine are offered at each communion station, but if you are uncomfortable with drinking from the common cup, then you can receive just the bread. Please do not dip your wafer into the wine.

Those who prefer to receive a blessing should keep their hands firmly down, as a sign to the clergy.

GLUTEN FREE

If you require a gluten-free wafer please mention this to the stewards when you are invited to move to receive communion; they will be able to direct you.

MOBILITY

If you have mobility difficulties and would like Communion brought to you, please speak to a steward before the service.

BABIES AND YOUNG CHILDREN

We are delighted to welcome babies and young children to the service today. There is a *do-it-yourself* crèche in the Baptistry; adults must supervise their own children at all times. We also have some specially-prepared children's activity bags, which are available from the stewards.

Baby-changing facilities are located in the toilets outside Seasons café. Please ask one of our stewards to direct you if you need them.

LEGAL PRELIMINARIES

At their retreat the ordinands took the Oath of Allegiance and the Oath of Canonical Obedience and made the Declaration of Assent before the bishop in the following form:

THE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE

I, A B, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles the Third, his heirs and successors, according to the law: So help me God.

THE OATH OF CANONICAL OBEDIENCE

I, A B, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Lord Bishop of Guildford and his successors, in all things lawful and honest: so help me God.

THE DECLARATION OF ASSENT

Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds. which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

Declaration

I, A B, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorized or allowed by Canon.

PROCESSIONS BEFORE THE SERVICE

The congregation remains seated when the procession of ordinands and (separately) the procession of the supporting ministers enter the Cathedral in advance of the service.

WELCOME

The Interim Dean, the Venerable Stuart Beake, welcomes the congregation.

THE GATHERING AND PRESENTATION

All stand to sing the opening hymn, during which the choir, clergy and bishops process into the nave.

PROCESSIONAL HYMN



When morning gilds the skies, my heart awakening cries: may Jesus Christ be praised! alike at work and prayer I find my Lord is there: may Jesus Christ be praised!

To God, the Word on high the hosts of angels cry: may Jesus Christ be praised! Let mortals, too, upraise their voice in hymns of praise: may Jesus Christ be praised!

Let earth's wide circle round in joyful notes resound: may Jesus Christ be praised! Let air and sea and sky from depth to height reply: may Jesus Christ be praised!

All turn to face the bishop, who greets the people from the font at the back of the nave. The font is the place of baptism, the sacrament from which all ministry springs, to which the bishop will refer in the introduction to the service.

THE GREETING

The bishop greets the people

Bishop Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All Blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.

There is one body and one spirit.

All There is one hope to which we were called;

one Lord, one faith, one baptism,

All one God and Father of all.

Peace be with you

All and also with you.

The bishop introduces the service, saying

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwellingplace of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given particular ministries. Priests are ordained to lead God's people in the offering of praise and the proclamation of the gospel. They share with the Bishop in the oversight of the Church, delighting in its beauty and rejoicing in its wellbeing. They are to set the example of the Good Shepherd always before them as the pattern of their calling. With the Bishop and their fellow presbyters, they are to sustain the community of the faithful by the ministry of word and sacrament, that we all may grow into the fullness of Christ and be a living sacrifice acceptable to God.

PRAYERS OF PENITENCE

Deacon As we stand together before God,

and trusting in his grace alone,

let us join with these ordinands in confessing our sins.

All Almighty God, our heavenly Father,

we have sinned against you and against our neighbour in thought and word and deed,

through negligence, through weakness,

through our own deliberate fault.

We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us,

forgive us all that is past

and grant that we may serve you in newness of life

to the glory of your name.

Amen.

Bishop May almighty God have mercy on you,

forgive you your sins,

and bring you to everlasting life, through lesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The procession continues up the central aisle, as the conclusion of the opening hymn is sung. All turn back to face the front of the nave.



The night becomes as day when from the heart we say: may Jesus Christ be praised! the powers of darkness fear when this glad song they hear: may Jesus Christ be praised!

Does sadness fill my mind? My strength in him I find: may Jesus Christ be praised! When earthly hopes grow dim my comfort is in him: may Jesus Christ be praised!

Be this, while life is mine, my canticle divine: may Jesus Christ be praised! Be this the eternal song through all the ages long: may Jesus Christ be praised!

THE PRESENTATION

All sit

The ordinands are presented to the bishops by the archdeacons. The Venerable Martin Breadmore presents the ordinands from the archdeaconry of Dorking; the Venerable Catharine Mabuza presents the ordinands from the archdeaconry of Surrey.

Archdeacon says

Bishops, I present N to be ordained to the office of priest in the Church of God; he/she is to serve in the parish of N.

Each ordinand stands as their name is said, and remains standing before the bishops.

When the ordinands have been presented, the bishop asks these questions, to which the Diocesan Director of Ordinands responds.

Bishop Have those whose duty it is to know these ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning?

DDO They have.

Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in the ministry for which each is being presented?

DDO They do.

The bishop turns to the ordinands and says

Bishop Do you believe that God is calling you to the ministry for which you are being presented?

Ordinands I do so believe.

Bishop I invite the Archdeacons to confirm that the ordinands have taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

Archdeacons They have duly taken the oath of allegiance to the Sovereign and the oath of canonical obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

THE COLLECT

All stand The bishop introduces a period of silent prayer, saying

Let us pray for these ordinands, and for the ministry of the whole people of God.

Almighty God,
whose blessed apostles Peter and Paul
glorified you in their death as in their life:
grant that your Church,
inspired by their teaching and example,
and made one by your Spirit,
may ever stand firm upon the one foundation,
Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

All Amen.

All sit THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

2 Corinthians 5.17-6.2 read by Nabila Camp

A reading from Paul's second letter to the Corinthians.

If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

'At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you.'
See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation!

For the word of the Lord.

All thanks be to God.

PSALM 95

The congregation remains seated for the singing of the psalm. The choir sings the response through once, which is then repeated by all. All sing the response during the psalm, as indicated.



O come, let us sing to the Lord:

let us heartily rejoice in the rock of our salvation.

Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving:

and be glad in him with psalms.

For the Lord is a great God:

and a great king above all gods. Response

In his hand are the depths of the earth:

GOSPEL READING

John 4.27-30, 39-42 read by the Reverend Canon Cathy Blair

When the Gospel is announced the reader says

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.



Just then Jesus' disciples came. They were astonished that he was speaking with a woman, but no one said, 'What do you want?' or, 'Why are you speaking with her?' Then the woman left her water-jar and went back to the city. She said to the people, 'Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done! He cannot be the Messiah, can he?' They left the city and were on their way to him.

Many Samaritans from that city believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me everything I have ever done.' So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them; and he stayed there for two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman, 'It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Saviour of the world.'

THE LITURGY OF ORDINATION

THE DECLARATIONS

The ordinands stand, facing the bishops. The bishops address the congregation.

Bishop

Priests are called to be servants and shepherds among the people to whom they are sent. With their bishops and fellow ministers, they are to proclaim the word of the Lord and to watch for the signs of God's new creation. They are to be messengers, watchmen and stewards of the Lord; they are to teach and to admonish, to feed and provide for his family, to search for his children in the wilderness of this world's temptations, and to guide them through its confusions, that they may be saved through Christ for ever. Formed by the word, they are to call their hearers to repentance and to declare in Christ's name the absolution and forgiveness of their sins.

With all God's people, they are to tell the story of God's love. They are to baptize new disciples in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and to walk with them in the way of Christ, nurturing them in the faith. They are to unfold the Scriptures, to preach the word in season and out of season, and to declare the mighty acts of God. They are to preside at the Lord's table and lead his people in worship, offering with them a spiritual sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. They are to bless the people in God's name. They are to resist evil, support the weak, defend the poor, and intercede for all in need. They are to minister to the sick and prepare the dying for their death. Guided by the Spirit, they are to discern and foster the gifts of all God's people, that the whole Church may be built up in unity and faith.

The bishop addresses the ordinands directly

We trust that long ago you began to weigh and ponder all this, and that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to devote yourself wholly to his service, so that as you daily follow the rule and teaching of our Lord and grow into his likeness, God may sanctify the lives of all with whom you have to do.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Ordinands I do so accept them.

Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all studies that will deepen your faith and fit you to bear witness to the truth of the gospel?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you lead Christ's people in proclaiming his glorious gospel, so that the good news of salvation may be heard in every place?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you faithfully minister the doctrine and sacraments of Christ as the Church of England has received them, so that the people committed to your charge may be defended against error and flourish in the faith?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you, knowing yourself to be reconciled to God in Christ, strive to be an instrument of God's peace in the Church and in the world?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a pattern and example to Christ's people?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you accept and minister the discipline of this Church, and respect authority duly exercised within it?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to make Christ known among all whom you serve?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

The congregation stands. The ordinands all turn to face the congregation.

Bishop Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations. Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

All It is.

Will you continually pray for them?

All We will.

Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

All We will.

The ordinands turn back to face the bishop, who continue, addressing them

In the name of our Lord we bid you remember the greatness of the trust that is now to be committed to your charge. Remember always with thanksgiving that the treasure now to be entrusted to you is Christ's own flock, bought by the shedding of his blood on the cross. It is to him that you will render account for your stewardship of his people.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened.

Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The bishops and ordinands kneel; the congregation sits. All pray silently for a while.

For those who are lost and for those who have strayed, that they may return to the way of Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

For the sick and suffering, for the aged and infirm, for the lonely and neglected, and for all who remember and care for them, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For the poor and the hungry, for the homeless and the oppressed, for all prisoners and captives, and for all who are persecuted for their faith, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For Charles our King, for the leaders of the nations, and for all in authority, let us pray to the Lord.

For ourselves, for grace to repent and amend our lives, that we may be pardoned and absolved from all our sins, let us pray to the Lord.

The ordinands continue to kneel; the bishop stands to pray

We praise and glorify you, almighty Father, because in your infinite love you have formed throughout the world a holy people for your own possession, a royal priesthood, a universal Church.

We praise and glorify you because you have given us your only Son Jesus Christ, the image of your eternal and invisible glory, the firstborn of all creation and head of the Church.

We praise and glorify you that by his death he has overcome death; and that, having ascended into heaven, he has given his gifts abundantly, to equip your holy people for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants, whom we ordain in your name, to share as priests in the ministry of the gospel of Christ, the Apostle and High Priest of our faith, and the Shepherd of our souls.

Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:

As the prayer continues, the bishops and priests lay hands on the head of each ordinand, and the bishop says

Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant *N* for the office and work of a priest in your Church.

When the bishop has laid hands on all the ordinands, the prayer continues

Through your Spirit, heavenly Father, give these your servants grace and power to proclaim the gospel of your salvation and minister the sacraments of the new covenant. Renew them in holiness, and give them wisdom and discipline to work faithfully with those committed to their charge.

In union with their fellow servants in Christ, may they reconcile what is divided, heal what is wounded and restore what is lost.

May they declare your blessings to your people; may they proclaim Christ's victory over the powers of darkness, and absolve in Christ's name those who turn to him in faith; so shall a people made whole in Christ offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to you, our God and Father, to whom, with the Son and the Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever.

All Amen.

THE GIVING OF THE BIBLE

The newly ordained stand. The bishops give a Bible to each of them, and then say

Receive this book, as a sign of the authority which God has given you this day to preach the gospel of Christ and to minister his holy sacraments.

THE WELCOME

The Interim Dean, the Venerable Stuart Beake, addresses the newly ordained priests, saying

God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation.

The newly ordained turn to face the congregation as all respond

All We welcome you as ambassadors for Christ: let the word of Christ dwell in you richly.

The congregation welcomes the newly ordained with applause.

All stand The newly ordained stand to face the bishops.

Again he praised you, gave it to them and said:


Drink this, all of you;
