

THE SEASON OF LENT

The season of Lent enables us to prepare for Easter, the most important festival of the church year. Easter is the principal occasion for baptism and for the reconciliation of those who had been excluded from the Church's fellowship for apostasy or serious faults. This connection explains the characteristic notes of Lent – self-examination, penitence, self-denial and study, to which almsgiving has traditionally been added.

Sit OLD TESTAMENT Isaiah 40.27-41.13

The first lesson is written in the fortieth chapter of the prophet Isaiah, beginning at the twenty-seventh verse.

Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, 'My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God'? Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless.

Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

Listen to me in silence, O coastlands; let the peoples renew their strength; let them approach, then let them speak; let us together draw near for judgement.

Who has roused a victor from the east. summoned him to his service? He delivers up nations to him, and tramples kings under foot; he makes them like dust with his sword. like driven stubble with his bow. He pursues them and passes on safely, scarcely touching the path with his feet. Who has performed and done this, calling the generations from the beginning? I, the Lord, am first, and will be with the last. The coastlands have seen and are afraid, the ends of the earth tremble: they have drawn near and come. Each one helps the other, saying to one another, 'Take courage!' The artisan encourages the goldsmith, and the one who smooths with the hammer encourages the one who strikes the anvil, saying of the soldering, 'It is good'; and they fasten it with nails so that it cannot be moved. But you, Israel, my servant,
Jacob, whom I have chosen,
the offspring of Abraham, my friend;
you whom I took from the ends of the earth,
and called from its farthest corners,
saying to you, 'You are my servant,
I have chosen you and not cast you off';
do not fear, for I am with you,
do not be afraid, for I am your God;
I will strengthen you, I will help you,
I will uphold you with my victorious right hand.

Yes, all who are incensed against you shall be ashamed and disgraced; those who strive against you shall be as nothing and shall perish.
You shall seek those who contend with you, but you shall not find them; those who war against you shall be as nothing at all.
For I, the Lord your God, hold your right hand; it is I who say to you, 'Do not fear, I will help you.'

Here ends the first lesson.

Text: Luke 1.46-55

Sit **NEW TESTAMENT** 2 Timothy 4.1-18

The second lesson is written in the fourth chapter of Paul's second letter to Timothy, beginning at the first verse.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

Do your best to come to me soon, for Demas, in love with this present world, has deserted me and gone to Thessalonica; Crescens has gone to Galatia, Titus to Dalmatia. Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful in my ministry. I have sent Tychicus to Ephesus. When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, also the books, and above all the parchments. Alexander the coppersmith did me great harm; the Lord will pay him back for his deeds. You also must beware of him, for he strongly opposed our message.

At my first defence no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Here ends the second lesson.

JOURNEYING THROUGH LENT

Lent has always been a time for deepening discipleship and walking with Jesus on the path to Calvary and through the Cross to the glories of Easter Day. As part of our journey through Lent, we are sharing the opportunity to walk with Jesus on the Via Dolorosa by praying the Stations of the Cross. On Sundays 16 March, 23 March, 30 March and 6 April after Evensong we will be holding a service of The Stations of the Cross where we journey with Jesus to the Cross. This simple service which has been a part of the Church's liturgy for over 900 years, is loaded with meaning and is a beautiful way to focus our devotions during Lent. We encourage people to come to our beautiful service of Evensong before the Stations of the Cross, however, if you wish to

come just to the Stations then please feel free to do that; we will begin at 7.00pm. I look forward to seeing many of you there.

LENT BOOKS

In recent years Canon Chris has suggested particular Lent Books for personal reading and reflection. This year he offers two:

- Searched Me Out and Known Me: Journeying Lent with the Psalms, by Charlie Bell. This is first and foremost a pastoral Lent book based on an exploration of the Psalms, and offers reflections for Ash Wednesday, for each Sunday in Lent, and then each day in Holy Week. Each chapter is built around a psalm, the day's Gospel according to the Church of England's calendar of readings and concludes with the Church of England's daily Collect.
- **Healing Wounds**, **by Erik Varden**. The writer is a Norwegian Catholic bishop, spiritual writer and monk. Structured to guide readers through a journey of reflection, beginning with the raw reality of suffering and moving toward the possibility of redemption and renewal, the book invites readers to sit with their own experiences of pain, consider how these might be transformed through faith and introspection, and by reflection on Christ's passion and its implications for believers.

Why not give one of them a try – and perhaps share your experiences with Chris or his clergy colleagues after Sunday services as we walk through the Season together? And if neither of these appeals to you, perhaps try to find something else to read or to do in order to deepen your faith during Lent.

HOLY WEEK PREACHER

Dean Bob is delighted to announce that our Holy Week preacher this year will be Father George Guiver CR. Fr George is a member of the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield, where last year's preacher, Fr Charlie, is also one of the brethren. Fr George is an accomplished writer, preacher and teacher on the liturgy, prayer and ministry and will be preaching throughout the whole of Holy Week.

His theme throughout Holy Week will be the Seven Last Sayings of Jesus and there will be more information about this in the coming weeks. Holy Week is an important time of listening, learning and deepening discipleship and Fr George will be a wonderful aid to us on our Christian journey.
